




Collecting diapers, wipes, and cash donations.

- CT Poverty Statistics: 38% of children under the age of 3 years old live below the poverty level.
- Bare Necessities is the only recognized diaper bank on the CT shoreline.
- 1 in 3 families in the US have a diaper need.
- 6-12 diapers are needed per day for infants/toddlers at an average cost of \$100 per month.
- Children must have a full day's worth of disposable diapers to attend daycare.
- Diapers and toiletries are not covered under safety net programs such as SNAP (food stamps) or WIC (woman, infants and children).







Money Matter\$ - Carl Engelhart - Finance Chairperson

Just a few notes as to where UMC-Clinton stands financially at the end of the 1stQtr25.

- Our Financial Secretary Jackie recorded and deposited \$41,600 of contributions received 1Qtr25.
- Our Treasurer Carol wrote checks totaling (\$60,700) that cashed during 1StQtr25.
- Simple checkbook math tells us we spent (\$19,100) more than we received 1stQ25.
- Bank balances and Investments were drawn down to cover the deficit.
- UMC-Clinton Investments @ 12/31/24 were \$998,600
- (\$12,300) has been withdrawn during 1stQ25 to cover the deficit.
- The stock market has dropped equity values 5.7% Jan-Apr25.
- Investments are estimated to be \$929,400 down (\$69,200)
